



Anne C Petersen, PhD

Anne Petersen is Founder/President of Global Philanthropy Alliance, a foundation making grants to young entrepreneurs in Africa. She is also an adjunct Research Professor, University of Michigan, Integrated Systems Design in the College of Engineering, and faculty affiliate of the Africa Studies Center STEM initiative and the S&T Policy Program, Ford Policy School.

Petersen held administrative and faculty roles at Stanford U, U Minnesota, Penn State U, and U Chicago. She was Senior VP Programs, WK Kellogg Foundation and US President-nominated/Senate-confirmed National Science Foundation Deputy Director/COO. In addition, she was Associate Director, Health at the MacArthur Foundation, worked closely with the Swiss Jacobs Foundation in many roles, has been a consultant to many foundations, and is currently on the Board of the Templeton World Charity Foundation.

Petersen authored/edited 18 books and over 350 articles, currently emphasizing global science policy as well as global philanthropy, with continuing emphases on adolescence/youth development and evaluation/research methods. Her honors include election to National Academy of Medicine (NASEM: National Academies of Science, Engineering, Medicine) and Fellow in several scientific societies including AAAS, ISSBD, APA (three divisions), and founding Fellow of APS. She co-founded Society of Research on Adolescence and was President of several scientific societies. She chairs NASEM Policy & Global Affairs Divisional Committee and serves on NRC Governing Board, NSF International Committee, and the Physical Sciences Division Council, University of Chicago, among other US/global voluntary boards/committees.

All Petersen degrees are University of Chicago: BA mathematics, MS statistics, PhD measurement, evaluation, and statistical analysis.
